FY 2020-21 LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS REQUEST Office of Capital and Forensic Writs

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215 Office of Capital and Forensic Writs

Since 2010, the Office of Capital and Forensic Writs (OCFW) has had the privilege of serving an essential function for the State of Texas and the criminal justice system: ensuring that convictions are constitutionally sound, reliable, and untainted by questionable forensic science.

OCFW does this through two basic programs:

(1) CAPITAL POST-CONVICTION REPRESENTATION.

- a. OCFW safeguards the constitutionality of death penalty convictions and sentences by investigating and litigating all possible constitutional claims in post-conviction litigation in Texas courts, ensuring that these fundamental claims are fully aired, and Texas courts can consider them efficiently and fairly.
- b. OCFW represents approximately 80% of persons sentenced to death in mandated capital post-conviction proceedings, ensuring that all possible claims are investigated consistent with professional norms and statutory requirements, and all courts are well equipped to decide all possible claims in one full and fair court proceeding soon after conviction, rather than in successive rounds of piecemeal litigation.
- c. Capital post-conviction representation and investigation are mandated by statute (Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, article 11.071 sec. 2, 3), and OCFW provides this service to the State pursuant to the authority granted to it by section 78.054 of the Texas Government Code.
- d. By providing this service, OCFW safeguards the integrity and reliability of the Texas criminal justice system.

(2) FORENSIC WRIT REPRESENTATION.

- a. OCFW represents a limited number of incarcerated persons serving sentences for non-capital crimes, where questionable forensic science tainted their conviction. *See* Tex. Govt. Code sec. 78.054.
- b. The only cases OCFW handles under this mandate are those of potential wrongful conviction or innocence that have been referred by the Texas Forensic Science Commission following an investigation into the professional negligence or misconduct of forensic analysts or unsupported forensic scientific analysis and testimony.
- c. The 84th Legislature expanded OCFW's mandate, but this priority was not funded until the current biennium when OCFW received 2 FTEs to handle these cases involving questionable forensic science. The need is great; while OCFW expected a limited number of referrals, the Forensic Science Commission referred 60 cases in FY2020.

In 2015, the Court of Criminal Appeals appointed current OCFW Director, Benjamin Wolff, and reappointed him to a second four-year term in 2019. As a judicial branch agency, OCFW relies on many services provided by the Office of Court Administration (OCA) to function effectively. As such, OCFW fully supports the baseline and exceptional appropriations requests of OCA.

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OCFW'S SERVICES ARE BOTH ESSENTIAL AND ECONOMICAL

OCFW practices statewide, focusing narrowly on constitutional issues, forensic science, and wrongful convictions. Capital and forensic writ cases are extraordinarily complex and require post-conviction and appellate specialists to provide this highly technical and often resource-intensive representation. OCFW's caseload comes from counties, big and small, across the State of Texas. Where OCFW is unable to provide representation, counties bear the entire cost of representation by paying appointed attorneys, mitigation specialists, investigators, and experts often on an hourly basis. This is a burden for smaller counties where capital post-conviction representation needs arise, because they may not have the resources or capability to provide the requisite level of representation.

OCFW is funded entirely from the Fair Defense Account (Fund 5073), a dedicated account that can only be spent on indigent defense. OCFW is not seeking general revenue to fund its important programs.

As an institutional public defender program, OCFW benefits from economies of scale and provides cost-effective representation by highly specialized, supervised staff, who deliver mandated services while keeping costs lower than commensurate representation delivered by attorneys in private practice.

OCFW'S LOW PAY HAS CREATED UNUSUALLY HIGH TURNOVER

In just 10 years, OCFW has lost 38 employees—the equivalent of losing 185% of its current staff. In 2017, OCFW lost 22% of its attorneys. In 2018, 48%. In 2019, 53%. During those same years, the Office of Court Administration saw attrition of 10% or less, and the State Prosecuting Attorney—OCFW's closest analog—saw 0% attrition. Turnover among OCFW mitigation specialists is even more startling: attrition among these vital staff climbed from 36% in 2017 to 100% in 2019.

In 2018, OCFW commissioned an outside audit to assess its challenges and effectiveness. The audit identified two drivers of attrition at OCFW—uncompetitive salaries and caseloads that exceeded national standards. With the help of the 86th Legislature, OCFW made progress toward reducing its caseload to national standards. But uncompetitive salaries continue to destabilize OCFW.

During informal exit interviews, departing staff consistently tell OCFW leadership that they are leaving to pursue similar work at a higher rate of pay. Many former OCFW staff now populate different capital public defender offices across the state; after getting training and experience at OCFW, they leave for other, better paying jobs in the federal and state criminal justice field. After federal defenders opened Capital Habeas Units in Austin

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and Dallas in 2017, OCFW attrition increased. The creation of the Travis County Public Defender will likely have a similar effect when it begins hiring staff attorneys this year.

The business costs of turnover are steep. Economists estimate that that the direct replacement costs for salaried employees can exceed 50% to 60% of an employee's annual salary. OCFW is no different. Being shorthanded means that OCFW cannot accept as many new cases, or efficiently staff and litigate existing cases. Because of staff turnover and the corresponding inability to adequately staff many cases, OCFW's effectiveness and impact is diminished. Given the complexity of capital and forensic post-conviction work, there is a steep learning curve to each post-conviction matter that OCFW handles. Capital trials sometimes last for months, and the record of these proceedings amount to tens of thousands of pages with tens of thousands of other pages of case files and documentary evidence that must be reviewed. Forensic cases are sometimes smaller, but their subject matter is more complicated. Former attorneys' caseloads must be assumed by remaining staff, who must start their review of the voluminous, complex record from scratch. While the litigation of cases can take 5-8 years, OCFW has been unable to retain many staff for longer than a fraction of that time, leading to less reliable adjudication.

OCFW's TURNOVER IS DRIVEN BY UNCOMPETTIVE SALARIES

The work of OCFW attorneys and mitigation specialists is complex, highly specialized, and vitally important to the fair administration of justice in Texas. But OCFW is unable to retain talented employees because it is unable to pay competitive salaries. Staff are highly dedicated to the mission of OCFW and motivated to perform exceptional work for their clients and the State of Texas on a consistent basis. Given present salary levels, however, OCFW is unable to retain its employees because they receive offers to perform rewarding work at similar governmental agencies at 150% or even 200% of what OCFW can pay them.

In fiscal year 2021, OCFW anticipates its average attorney salary will reach only \$75,000. By comparison:

- Assistant State Prosecuting Attorneys, who perform similarly specialized appellate representation before the Court of Criminal Appeals on behalf of the State of Texas, earn \$115,573 (E-Class data from State Auditor);
- According to the State Bar of Texas, the mean salary for appellate attorneys in Austin in 2015 was \$203,000 (https://www.texasbar.com/AM/Template.cfm?Section=Demographic_and_Economic_Trends&Template=/CM/ContentDisplay.cfm&Content_ID=34183);
- Assistant Federal Public Defenders who do similarly specialized post-conviction, habeas corpus representation can earn up \$170,000 in salaries tied to the earnings of similarly situated Assistant United States Attorneys (Information provided by the Federal Public Defender).
- Attorneys at the newly formed Travis County Public Defender with just six years of experience can earn up to \$124,000, while those with eight years of experience can earn up to \$132,000 (based on information provided by the Chief Public Defender, Travis County).

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• The Texas Workforce Commission reports that the average salary in the Austin-Round Rock statistical area for experienced attorneys is \$154,043 (https://texaswages.com/MSAWages/MSASocDetails?soc=23-1011&wgeType=mean).

Likewise, in this fiscal year, OCFW anticipates that its average mitigation specialist salary will reach only \$58,000. By comparison:

- The Texas Workforce Commission reports that the average salary for legal support professionals in the capital area is \$74,198 (https://texaswages.com/WDAWages/WDASocDetails?soc=23-2099&wgeType=mean).
- Mitigation specialists and investigators employed by the Federal Public Defender can earn salaries that range from \$68,994 to \$151,061 (Information provided by Federal Public Defender).
- Investigators employed by Travis County earn salaries that start at \$72,000 (information provided by Chief Public Defender, Travis County);
- Mitigation specialists in private practice commonly earn between \$125 and \$175 per hour for their services by federal courts, see https://www.fd.org/sites/default/files/criminal_defense_topics/essential_topics/cja_panel_information/2019-dec-10_dsc_memo_re_rev_experience-based_hourly_rate_changes_002.pdf, and between \$75 and \$125 per hour by Texas courts (information on file with OCFW).

OCFW will continue to suffer high rates of attrition, while employees can leave state employment and walk a few blocks to join a different governmental agency and earn substantially more performing similar or even less-complex, lower-stakes work.

EXCEPTIONAL BUDGET REQUESTS

OCFW attorneys are as important to the State of Texas and its administration of criminal justice as their prosecutorial counterparts who perform similarly complex appellate litigation before the Court of Criminal Appeals. Mitigation specialists are likewise an invaluable part of the process as their investigations uncover much of the evidence that is necessary for reliable adjudication. OCFW, however, cannot fulfill its mission when it cannot retain knowledgeable, experienced staff. To combat the chronic attrition of essential staff, OCFW has two related exceptional budgetary items:

1. OCFW seeks salary parity for attorney staff with its colleagues from the Office of the State Prosecuting Attorney, so that its attorneys earn, on average, \$115,000 per year. In addition, to retain its indispensable mitigation staff, OCFW seeks appropriations so that mitigation specialists earn on average \$75,000. To fund these priorities within both budgetary strategies, OCFW seeks \$1,181,000 over the biennium from the Fair Defense Account (Fund 5073), which is limited to indigent defense purposes.

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2. OCFW seeks restoration of 5% budgetary base reduction from the Fair Defense Account (Fund 5073). Because of its small size and lean budget, OCFW would be forced to reduce its salary budgetary line item to account for the 5% base reduction in fiscal years 2022 and 2023. Without the restoration of this cut, OCFW would be forced to reduce its salary budget item over the biennium by \$166,980 in its capital strategy and \$18,554 in its forensic writ strategy. This would have the effect of compounding the existing emergency created by low, uncompetitive salaries, leading to additional losses of valuable staff.

OCFW is cognizant of and sensitive to the pain and budgetary problems associated with the pandemic. OCFW, however, is facing an extraordinary staffing crisis due to uncompetitive salaries. Without urgent action, OCFW's crisis can only be expected to further deteriorate.

REQUEST FOR UNEXPENDED BALANCE AUTHORITY

Uncertainty exists with respect to investigation and litigation costs because they vary based on the particulars of the case being filed, and whether a district court holds a live evidentiary hearing. Authority to carry forward unexpended balances within the biennium provides greater flexibility in managing expenses that may vary greatly from year to year. This will be particularly important in the upcoming biennium where costs may be deferred and fluctuate more than normal due to the pandemic.

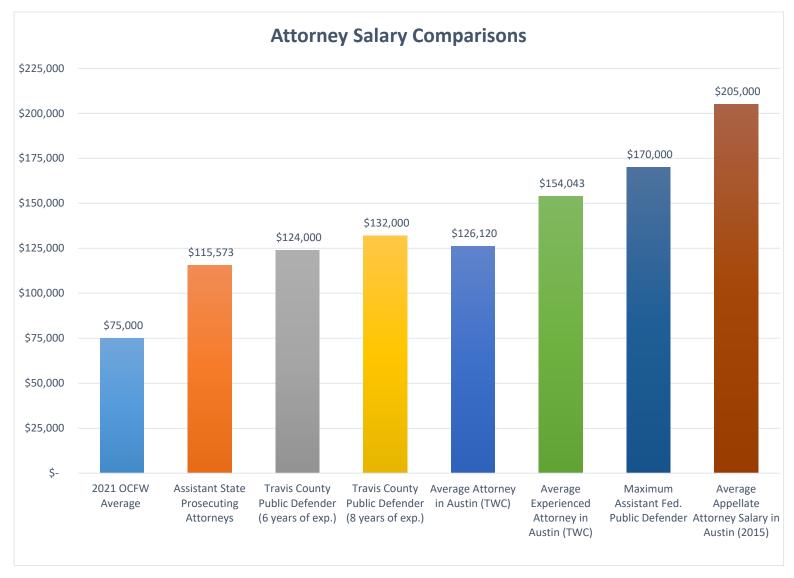

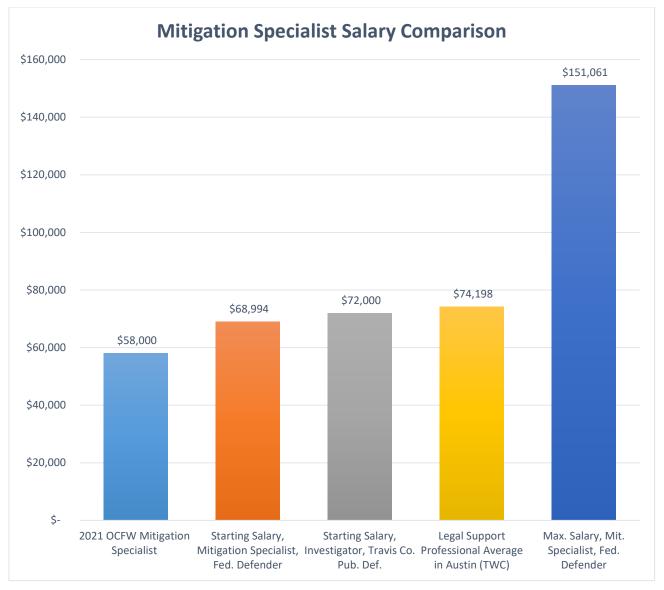
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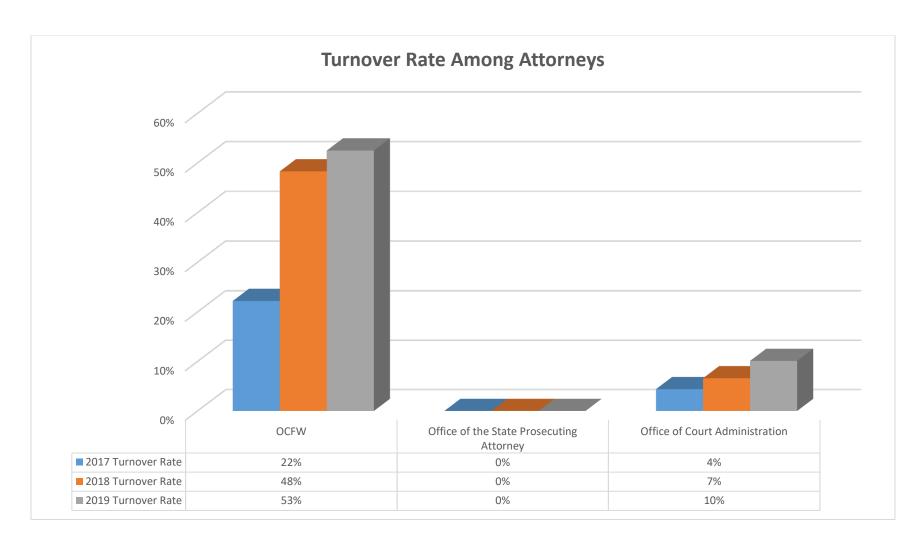
In order to meet its mandate and provide essential services to the state, OCFW respectfully asks that its appropriations request receive favorable consideration.

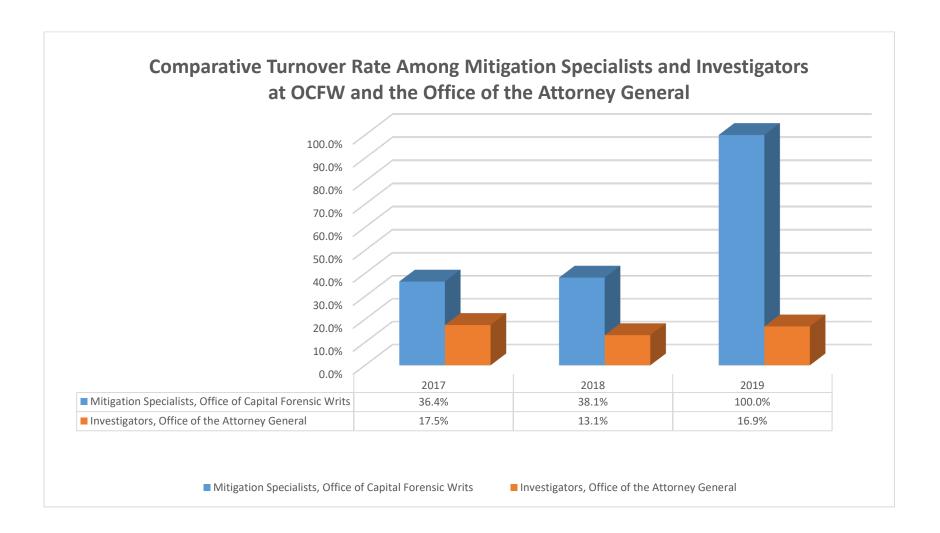

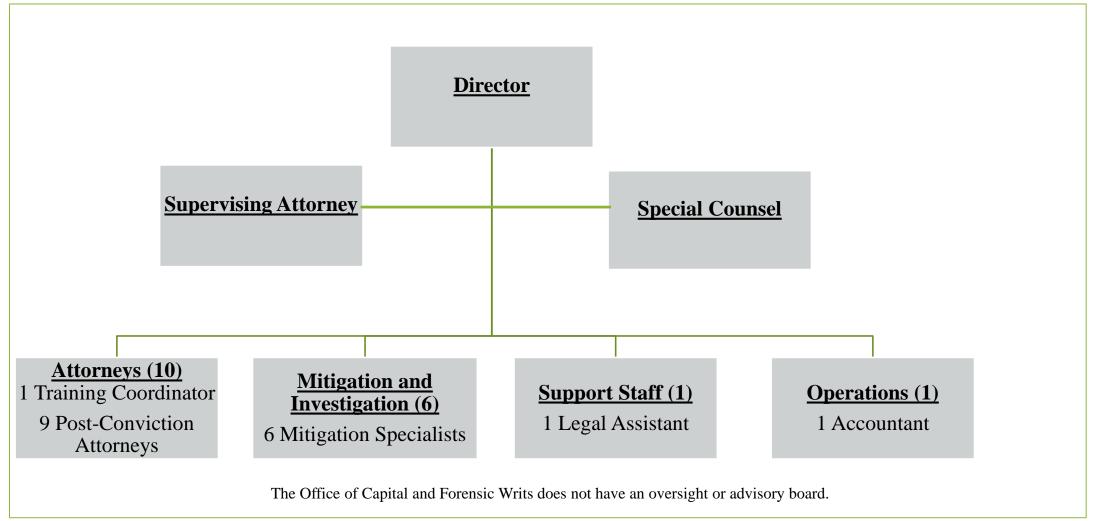




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Organizational Chart

Since 2010, the Office of Capital and Forensic Writs (OCFW) has the privilege of serving an essential function for the State of Texas and the criminal justice system: ensuring that capital and noncapital convictions are constitutionally sound and untainted by questionable forensic science. By providing this service, OCFW safeguards the integrity and reliability of the Texas criminal justice system.

OCFW serves as a constitutional safety net for death penalty convictions and sentences by investigating and litigating all possible constitutional claims in post-conviction litigation in Texas courts, ensuring that these fundamental claims are decided in one full and fair court proceeding soon after conviction, rather than in successive rounds of piecemeal litigation.

Capital post-conviction presentation and investigation are mandated by statute. See Tex. Code of Criminal Procedure art. 11.071 sec. 2, 3. OCFW provides this service to the State pursuant to the authority granted to it by section 78.054 of the Texas Government Code.

OCFW represents approximately 80% of persons sentenced to death in statutorily-required capital post-conviction proceedings. Where OCFW is unable to provide representation, counties bear the cost of appointed private representation.

Texas law guarantees capital post-conviction applicants the right to competent representation.

The effectiveness of OCFW is hampered by damaging rates of staff attrition, caused by uncompetitive salaries. In 2019, OCFW experienced 53% attorney attrition and 100% mitigation specialist attrition. Staff are highly dedicated and mission driven, but OCFW is unable to retain employees because they receive offers to perform rewarding work at similar governmental agencies at 150% or even 200% of their OCFW salaries.

Texas Government Code section 78.054 provides that OCFW may not accept an appointment: (i) if a conflict of interest exists; (ii) OCFW has insufficient resources to provide adequate representation; (iii) OCFW is incapable of providing representation consistent with the rules of professional conduct; or (iv) other good cause exists.

The number of new cases OCFW can accept depends on how many cases are referred to it, the availability of staff with the capacity to provide professionally appropriate representation, and the financial resources of the agency.

The number of cases pending may fluctuate depending on litigation schedules set by courts and the rate at which courts make decisions, factors outside of OCFW's control.

OCFW represents a limited number of incarcerated persons serving sentences for non-capital crimes, where questionable forensic science tainted their conviction. See Tex. Govt. Code sec. 78.054. All of these cases involve wrongful convictions or innocence. The integrity of the criminal justice systems depends on the funding of lawyers to identify and litigate these cases.

The only cases OCFW handles under this mandate are those that have been referred by the Texas Forensic Science Commission following an investigation into the professional negligence or misconduct of forensic analysts or unsupported forensic scientific analysis and testimony.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

The 84th Legislature expanded OCFW's mandate include these cases, but this priority was not funded until the current biennium.

OCFW work in this area is limited what attorneys in the two funded FTE positions can reasonably accomplish.

The need is great; while OCFW expected a limited number of referrals, the Forensic Science Commission referred 60 cases in FY2020.

OCFW cannot accept referrals of cases directly; its jurisdiction is restricted to cases involving undermined forensic science that were referred in writing by the Forensic Science Commission. As such, OCFW's ability to handle cases involving forensic science is limited to those over which the Forensic Science Commission has jurisdiction.

Post-Conviction Capital Representation was listed as the top priority becase OCFW currently represents approximately 80% of death-sentenced inmates in statutorily-required post-conviction proceedings, and OCFW plays a vital role in ensuring that Texas courts are able to reliably and fairly adjudicate any constitutional challenges to these convictions and sentences. As such, OCFW's impact within this narrow, but important niche of the criminal justice is broad. Post-Conviction Non-capital Representation was listed as second because it is a newer program and while it serves a compelling interest to the State of Texas in ensuring that wrongful convictions based on bad forensic science are not left unaddressed, it's impact is less broad than the capital post-conviction representation that OCFW provides.

High rates of turnover are an institutional emergency. In 2019, attorney attrition was 53%; for mitigation specialists, it was 100%. Departing staff consistently tell OCFW leadership that they are leaving to pursue similar work at a higher rate of pay. Many former OCFW staff now populate different capital public defender offices across the state; after getting training and experience at OCFW, they leave for other, better paying jobs in the federal and state criminal justice field. The increase in attrition experienced by OCFW in 2017 after the federal public defender opened capital habeas units in Austin and Dallas exemplifies this trend. The creation of the Travis County Public Defender will likely have a similar effect when it begins hiring staff attorneys this year.

OCFW is unable to retain its employees because they receive offers at 150% or even 200% of what OCFW can pay them. OCFW seeks salary parity for attorney staff with its colleagues from the Office of the State Prosecuting Attorney, so that its attorneys earn, on average, \$115,000 per year. In addition, to retain its mitigation staff, OCFW seeks appropriations so that mitigation specialists earn on average \$75,000.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:

The average OCFW attorney salary is 75,000. Assistant State Prosecuting Attorneys, who perform similarly specialized appellate representation before the Court of Criminal Appeals on behalf of the State of Texas, earn \$115,573. Assistant Federal Defenders perform similar work for up to \$170,000. Attorneys with just 8 years of experience can earn up to \$132,000 at the new Travis County Public Defender. The average experienced attorney salary in Austin is \$154,043.

The average OCFW mitigation specialist salary is \$58,000. Mitigation specialists who leave state employment for private practice can earn between \$125 and \$175 an hour for federal work, and between \$75 and \$125 per hour for state court work. Mitigation specialists with the Federal Public Defender earn salaries that range from \$68,994 to \$151,061. Investigators with Travis County Public Defender will start at \$72,000.

At present, employees can leave OCFW to join a different governmental agency and earn substantially more performing similar or sometimes even lower-stakes work. Salary parity will help OCFW retain knowledgeable, experienced staff.

Because of its small size and lean budget, OCFW would be forced to reduce its salary budgetary line item to account for the 5% base reduction in fiscal year 2022 and 2023. This is because it is simply not possible to effectively litigate cases statewide without sufficient money for staff travel and a modest amount for professional fees and services, which funds expert assistance. Without the restoration of this cut, OCFW would be forced to reduce its salary budget item over the biennium by \$166,980 in its capital strategy and \$18,554 in its forensic writ strategy.

During the present biennium, OCFW was able to meet its 5% budgetary reduction target in part through COVID-19-related reductions in travel and professional fees and services spending, cost-savings in these necessary areas that OCFW does not anticipate during the 2022-2023 biennium.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:

The least deleterious way to meet this reduction target would be to keep staff positions unfilled, which would slow OCFW productivity. If the reduction target could not be met by keeping vacancies unfilled in the event of turnover, OCFW would be forced to reduce staff salaries. Because the capital post-conviction strategy of OCFW is larger than the forensic non-capital post-conviction strategy, the 5% reduction would more dramatically affect the salary item of the capital post-conviction strategy and OCFW's performance in that area. The effect on OCFW's non-capital post-conviction representation would be more modest.

OCFW staff are already dramatically underpaid in comparison to staff at other agencies, leading to crippling levels of turnover. Were OCFW's base budget to remain reduced by 5%, it would compound the existing emergency created by low, uncompetitive salaries, leading to additional losses of valuable staff.

B. Assessment of Fiscal Year - Efforts to Meet HUB Procurement Goals

Attainment:

Due to a change in OCFW's internal procurement process and method of payment (Pro-Card), the amounts spent with HUB vendors appear to not have been accurately captured by the HUB Consolidated report prepared by the Comptroller. OCFW regrets this error. In this biennium, OCFW will modify its processes so that these charges are reliably reported. In FY2018, the HUB report indicates that OCFW spent \$16,565 in commodity purchasing. In the same fiscal year, OCFW spent \$10,440 with one HUB-certified vendor, data that unfortunately is not reflected in this report. In FY2019, the HUB report indicates that OCFW spent \$15,274 in commodity purchasing. Agency records for the same year reflect that OCFW spent \$4,314 directly with the same HUB vendor. Thus, OCFW utilized HUB vendors for at least 63% of commodities purchased in 2018 and 28% in 2019.

Applicability:

The "Heavy Construction," "Building Construction," and "Special Trade" categories are inapplicable to OCFW.

Factors Affecting Attainment:

Many of the "other services" vendors were persons providing specialized legal or expert witness services which are difficult to procure through the HUB procurement process.

"Good-Faith" Efforts:

Due to issues associated with OCFW's internal procurement process and using method of payment (using a Pro-card, rather than a purchase order), OCFW's "good faith" efforts are not accurately reflected in the Consolidated HUB agency report. OCFW will rectify this error. OCFW has made efforts to purchase from certified HUB vendors to the extent possible, both directly and through Texas Smart Buy, and will continue to do so. Based on available financial data, OCFW met its HUB goals for commodities in 2018 and 2019.
