# FY 2020-21 LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS REQUEST Office of Capital and Forensic Writs

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## 215 Office of Capital and Forensic Writs

The Office of Capital and Forensic Writs (OCFW) is an agency of high public value with substantial challenges and resource needs.

OCFW opened its doors in 2010 as the state agency charged with representing capital defendants in post-conviction litigation. It currently handles about 70% of initial capital post-conviction cases in Texas. Counties assume financial responsibility for state-level capital post-conviction representation that is not provided by OCFW.

OCFW provides an essential service to the state, the Texas criminal justice system, and its clients by ensuring that the administration of the death penalty is constitutionally reliable and valid. It investigates, presents, and litigates all potential claims implicating the constitutionality of the death penalty in a particular case, ensuring that these fundamental claims are not defaulted and Texas courts can consider them efficiently and fairly. As an institutional public defender program, OCFW benefits from economies of scale and provides cost-effective representation by highly-specialized, supervised staff, who deliver mandated services while keeping costs lower than commensurate representation delivered by appointed private attorneys.

In 2015, OCFW's mandate expanded to include the representation of non-capitally sentenced inmates in innocence-related litigation involving challenges to the forensic science used to convict them. This priority, however, has not been funded, and the OCFW has not yet been able to take on any such cases.

When the OCFW was getting off the ground, it was structured and funded based on good faith estimates of what Texas capital post-conviction representation entailed. With eight years of data, these initial estimates have proven inadequate. OCFW represents clients for longer and obtains many more resource-intensive evidentiary hearings than initially projected, and litigation is more procedurally complex than initially conceptualized.

To assess the challenges and effectiveness of the OCFW, during the last biennium, the OCFW commissioned an outside audit by experienced public defense system evaluators (http://www.ocfw.texas.gov/media/11437/2018-assessment-of-the-texas-office-of-capital-and-forensic-writs-final.pdf). The assessment identified certain areas that negatively impacted OCFW's ability to timely and competently meet professional standards:

- An organizational structure that is inadequate to meet the challenges of managing and supervising an office of OCFW's size and complexity;
- High attrition rates among key staff;
- Caseloads substantially higher than applicable professional standards;
- Non-competitive salaries;
- A lack of sufficient financial resources to perform necessary litigation tasks in a timely manner across Texas.

The OCFW has three funding priorities for the FY2020-21 biennium. To fund these priorities, OCFW is not requesting General Revenue; rather, OCFW requests that all appropriations come from the Fair Defense Account, a dedicated account for indigent defense. In addition, because OCFW relies on many services provided by the Office of Court Administration (OCA) to function efficiently, OCFW fully supports the baseline appropriation and exceptional items sought by the OCA in their appropriations request.

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EXCEPTIONAL ITEM #1: REDUCE ATTRITION THROUGH MORE COMPETITIVE SALARIES AND CASELOAD MANAGEMENT

OCFW requests \$1,054,425 in funding over the biennium to combat attrition through competitive salaries and caseload management.

OCFW has an urgent problem with staff turnover. Since OCFW opened in 2010, 27 staff have departed, the equivalent of over 168% of the present staff size. This includes 14 attorneys, 10 mitigation specialists, and 3 support staff. The average attrition rate among attorneys since the Office opened is 27%; among mitigation specialists/investigators, it is 38%. During FY2018, the problem of attrition has been particularly acute. For fiscal year 2018, OCFW expects a 63% attrition rate for attorneys. By contrast, for the last five fiscal years, the average yearly turnover rate for the Texas judicial branch was about 10%.

The business costs of turnover are steep. Economists estimate that the direct replacement costs for salaried employees reach as high as 50% to 60% of an employee's annual salary.

OCFW is no different. Being shorthanded means that OCFW cannot accept as many new cases, or efficiently staff and litigate existing cases. Because of staff turnover and the corresponding inability of OCFW to adequately staff many cases, OCFW has been forced to recruit outside law firms to assume pro bono representation in particular cases. Outside counsel now assist OCFW with the litigation of four cases, and a private law firm relieved OCFW from representing a fifth. This development is neither a sustainable nor ideal solution.

There is a steep learning curve to each capital post-conviction matter that OCFW handles. Each OCFW case file includes a lengthy trial record, but commonly also contains about 50,000 individual files reflecting both pretrial preparation and post-conviction investigation, comprising 150 GB of material. The caseloads of departed staff often must be assumed by remaining staff, who must start their review of the voluminous record from scratch. Thus, attrition further increases the already excessive caseload carried by the staff who remain. Even when cases can be transferred to newly hired staff, the onboarding costs are substantial, because their review of the record must also necessarily start from scratch.

As a result, turnover at OCFW slows case staffing and litigation. During FY2018, OCFW moved for extensions at least 17 times in 12 different matters based on difficulties related to staff turnover and excessive caseloads.

As identified in the 2018 OCFW assessment, there are two reasons why attrition is a growing problem: noncompetitive salaries and caseloads that exceed national standards.

#### A. SALARIES ARE NONCOMPETITIVE AND BELOW MARKET

**OCFW Salaries:** 

Average OCFW Attorney Salary: \$70,000 Average OCFW Mitigation Specialist Salary: \$55,000

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Market Salary Range for Comparable Attorneys:

Assistant State Prosecuting Attorney: \$105,000 Assistant Public Defender (TX Regional Public Defender for Capital Cases): \$100,500

Assistant Federal Public Defender (Capital Habeas Unit): \$88,000 to \$114,000

Average Attorney Salary in Austin (Bureau of Labor Statistics): \$129,850

Market Salary Range for Mitigation Specialists:

Capital Mitigation Specialist (Capital Habeas Unit): \$74,000 to \$96,000

The salaries of Assistant State Prosecuting Attorneys are 50% higher than the average OCFW attorney salary. Salaries paid by the federal defender capital habeas units in Dallas and Austin are 30% to 60% higher. Assistant Public Defenders employed by the Regional Public Defender for Capital Cases (RPDO), a trial-level capital defender program that operates in over 180 mostly rural counties, earn 43% more than OCFW attorneys on average. Noncompetitive salaries and the presence of better paying competitor offices in close proximity are an ongoing source of staffing instability.

OCFW invests substantial human and financial capital in its staff; without more competitive salaries in line with what the State pays Assistant State Prosecuting Attorneys and other capital defender offices pay staff, OCFW will continue to lose key staff after they have been trained and gained valuable experience.

To reduce attrition, OCFW seeks salary parity with comparable and competitor offices, and requests appropriations to accomplish this purpose incrementally. For fiscal year 2020, OCFW requests \$157,500 during FY2020 to increase attorney salaries to \$85,000 on average and mitigation specialist salaries to \$62,500 on average. For fiscal year 2021, OCFW requests \$315,000 to increase average attorney salaries to \$100,000, and average mitigation specialist salaries to \$70,000, bringing OCFW staff salaries within range of the salaries at other agencies.

In total, OCFW requests \$472,500 over the biennium to remedy noncompetitive staff salaries that drive destabilizing attrition.

#### B. GREATER CASELOAD MANAGEMENT TO REDUCE ATTRITION

The second factor driving attrition is caseloads that exceed professional standards. The national professional caseload standard used by capital post-conviction offices in Texas and nationwide is 4 to 6 co-counseled cases per attorney. OCFW doesn't meet that standard, due to the volume of cases it has assumed relative to its staff size.

OCFW Caseload Average per attorney 8.5 (co-counseled cases)

Higher than normal caseloads not only drive attrition, but contribute to inefficient litigation and extension requests, because even the most productive and committed attorneys can accomplish only so much in a given year.

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As such, OCFW requests funding for two additional attorneys and one additional mitigation specialist to reduce average staff caseload to the upper limit of the national professional standards, which is 6 cases. OCFW requests that the salary levels for these additional attorneys be funded at the same level as the requested salary increases above: \$85,000 for each attorney in FY2020, followed by \$100,000 in FY2021; \$62,500 for the additional mitigation specialist in FY2020, followed by \$70,000 in FY2021.

The amount of this request to bring OCFW caseloads into compliance with professional standards is \$502,500, plus additional monies to fund necessary travel, training, and equipment for these staff.

# EXCEPTIONAL ITEM #2: NECESSARY FUNDING TO STRENGTHEN OCFW'S OFFICE MANAGEMENT AND FUNCTIONING.

Under this exceptional item, as detailed below, OCFW requests that a Deputy Director position be created and funded to supervise litigation and personnel; a Staff Services Officer position be created and funded to better manage our financial operations; additional money be provided to cover a burgeoning hearing docket throughout the state; and additional computers be funded to enable OCFW to make use of volunteer legal assistance.

The total amount requested over the biennium for this Exceptional Item is \$619,700.

#### A. CREATE AND FUND A DEPUTY DIRECTOR POSITION.

The Director of OCFW is the sole supervisor of the entire office. As the recent OCFW assessment notes, no one person can adequately supervise the work of eight attorneys, five mitigation specialists, a legal assistant, and an accountant, while handling a caseload, preparing reports and legislative materials, advocating for agency interests, and managing a diverse array of internal and external responsibilities. A Deputy Director would supervise litigation and personnel, freeing up the Director to manage internal and external responsibilities more effectively.

OCFW requests \$220,000 over the biennium to fund this position.

#### B. CREATE AND FUND A STAFF SERVICES OFFICER POSITION TO MORE EFFICIENTLY AND EFFECTIVELY MANAGE FINANCIAL OPERATIONS.

OCFW has only one accountant who handles all the agency's accounting, budgeting, purchasing, and human resources functions. Because of the statewide and travel-intensive work, the number of reimbursement and payments OCFW processes is two to three times larger than other agencies of similar size. In FY2017, OCFW processed and paid 1034 financial documents. By contrast, according to data maintained by the Comptroller, a similarly sized judicial agency with one accountant processed just 334 financial documents. Similarly, another judicial agency processed 299 financial documents—less than one-third the number OCFW generated—with the assistance of both an accountant and a Director of Finance.

To more efficiently and effectively manage its substantial accounting, budgeting, purchasing, and human resources needs, the OCFW requests that a Staff Services Officer position be created to work with OCFW's existing accountant and coordinate and oversee OCFW staff services. The salary cost of this staff person would be \$120,000 over the biennium.

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#### C. ADDITIONAL TRAVEL AND PROFESSIONAL FEES AND SERVICES TO HANDLE EVIDENTIARY HEARINGS IN DISTANT COUNTIES.

Evidentiary hearings are incredibly time- and resource-intensive undertakings. They are capital trial-like proceedings that often last for weeks and require months of preparation, substantial additional investigation inputs, expert assistance, on-location preparation of witnesses, and courtroom litigation in advance of the hearing. Because most OCFW cases are outside Austin, most hearings require out-of-town travel and hotel expenses. Last legislative session, the OCFW base budget was reduced by approximately \$112,000, which has limited the number of hearings OCFW can handle. Because of travel- and expert-assistance-related budgetary limitations as well as human resources limitations described elsewhere, OCFW has been forced to adjourn litigation into subsequent fiscal years and seek additional money from counties for expert costs.

To enable OCFW to meet the travel and litigation costs of its existing caseload, OCFW requests an additional \$250,000 over the biennium.

#### D. ADDITIONAL COMPUTERS

OCFW regularly relies on the volunteer assistance of summer and school-year interns and law clerks to perform necessary casework, but regularly has more volunteer staff than computers. During the present biennium, OCFW has had to depend on the generosity of the Office of Court Administration (OCA), which has lent OCFW computers for interns and law clerks. OCFW requests \$12,000 over the next biennium to purchase an additional six computers to cover these computer needs.

# EXCEPTIONAL ITEM #3: FUNDING TO REPRESENT NONCAPITAL INMATES IN INNOCENCE-RELATED LITIGATION INVOLVING CONSTITUTIONAL CHALLENGES TO FORENSIC SCIENCE

The 84<sup>th</sup> Legislature expanded OCFW's mandate to include the representation of noncapital inmates in cases where questionable forensic science contributed to the conviction (SB1743). The legislation permitted OCFW to represent individuals in post-conviction proceedings, if the case was referred to OCFW in writing by the Texas Forensic Science Commission. SB1743, however, did not appropriate any funding to OCFW for this work, and no additional funding accompanied the expanded mandate during either the 84<sup>th</sup> or 85<sup>th</sup> Legislative sessions. Consequently, OCFW has not been able to act on this expanded mandate, because it is unable to do so with existing resources.

There would be tremendous public value to this program. According to the National Registry of Exonerations, there have been at least 156 exonerations in Texas since 1989 in which flawed forensic science was a contributing factor. Funding this program would provide much needed representation to inmates with potentially meritorious innocence-related claims, whose cases have been vetted by and referred to OCFW by the Forensic Science Commission. These inmates have few, if any, other sources of representation.

As such, OCFW requests funding to represent inmates in these forensic science challenges at the levels generally anticipated by the fiscal note accompanying SB1743, plus necessary professional fees and services (to retain necessary experts for these complicated cases), travel, and equipment costs. Consistent with the fiscal note, OCFW requests that this program be funded incrementally through the addition of two attorneys in FY2020, and a third attorney in FY2021.

The total amount requested by OCFW for this priority over the biennium is \$578,875.

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#### 10% BIENNIAL BASE REDUCTION OPTIONS SCHEDULE.

OCFW is a small agency, and salaries comprise 80% of its budget. Ten percent of the OCFW base budget would be \$267,517 over the biennium. If OCFW's base budget were to be reduced by this amount, it would dramatically reduce OCFW's ability to fulfill its core functions, exacerbate attrition, and reduce the number of cases OCFW is able to litigate. To meet this targeted reduction in 2.5% increments, OCFW would be forced to reduce its workforce, and limit its travel. Any reduction in money allocated for travel would force OCFW to take locality into account when deciding what cases to accept. It would be difficult for OCFW to represent clients in cases further than 150 miles from Austin, because such cases would entail more substantial travel costs due to overnight hotel stays, air travel, lengthier car rental periods, extra fuel costs, and other increased travel costs.

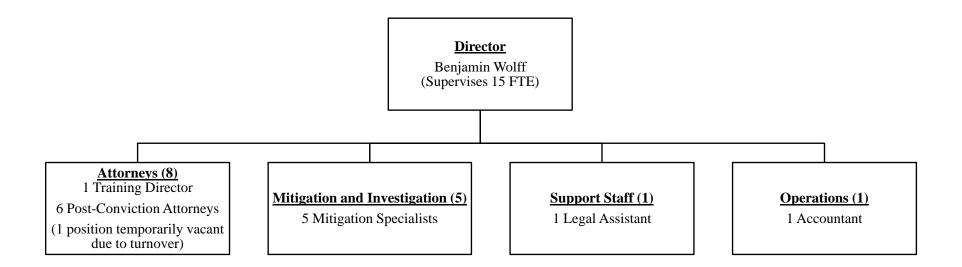
In order to meet its mandate and provide essential services to the state, OCFW respectfully asks that its appropriations request receive favorable consideration.

Pursuant to Texas Government Code Article 78, OCFW represents capital defendants in post-conviction litigation. OCFW first opened its doors in 2010, and currently handles about 70% of initial capital post-conviction cases in Texas. OCFW provides an essential service to the State and the criminal justice system by ensuring that the administration of the death penalty is constitutionally reliable and valid, and Texas courts can consider fundamental claims efficiently and fairly. Counties assume financial responsibility for Texas capital post-conviction representation that is not provided by OCFW.

In 2015, OCFW's mandate expanded to include the representation of non-capitally sentenced inmates in innocence-related litigation involving challenges to the forensic science used to convict them. This priority, however, has not been funded, and the OCFW has not yet been able to take on any such cases.

Texas law guarantees capital post-conviction applicants the right to competent representation.

The effectiveness of OCFW is hampered by damaging rates of staff attrition, caused by non-completive salaries and caseloads that exceed professional standards.

The work of OCFW is considerably more complicated, lengthy and, resource-intensive than initially projected when the agency was created in 2010. Initial projections estimated that cases would remain in state-court litigation for approximately three to four years; currently, OCFW projects cases will remain on its docket for six years, based on eight years of data. During the first four years of OCFW, the agency handled on average three and a half hearings per year. By contrast, during FY2017, OCFW juggled 24 different time- and resource-intensive evidentiary hearings statewide.

The number of new cases OCFW is able to accept depends on how many cases are referred to it, the availability of staff with the capacity to provide professionally appropriate representation, and the financial resources of the agency.

Texas Government Code section 78.054 provides that OCFW may not accept an appointment: (i) if a conflict of interest exists; (ii) OCFW has insufficient resources to provide adequate representation; (iii) OCFW is incapable of providing representation consistent with the rules of professional conduct; or (iv) other good cause exists.

The number of cases pending may fluctuate depending on litigation schedules set by courts and the rate at which courts make decisions, factors outside of OCFW's control.

#### Description/Justification for continuation of existing riders or proposed new rider

Any unexpended balances appropriated in fiscal year 2020 are hereby appropriated to the Office of Capital and Forensic Writs for fiscal year 2021 for the same purposes.

Investigation costs are a major component of the OCFW's budget. Uncertainty exists with respect to these costs because they vary based on the particulars of the case being filed, and whether a district court holds an evidentiary hearing requiring the live testimony of lay and expert witnesses. In addition, payments for outside experts may not be billed in the year services begin. Authority to carry forward unexpended balances between years of the biennium provides greater flexibility in managing expenses that may vary greatly from year to year.

Unexpended balances authority was given to the OCFW by the 82nd, 83rd, 84th and 85th Legislatures, R.S. The OCFW requests unexpended budget authority again in FY 2020-21.

OCFW requests appropriations to combat attrition through competitive salaries and caseload management.

Salaries for attorneys and mitigation specialists are noncompetitive, and. OCFW seeks parity incrementally. To accomplish this, OCFW requests \$157,500 during FY2020 to increase attorney salaries to \$85,000 on average and mitigation specialist salaries to \$62,500 on average. For fiscal year 2021, OCFW requests \$315,000 to increase average attorney salaries to \$100,000, and average mitigation specialist salaries to \$70,000, bringing OCFW staff salaries within range of the salaries at other agencies.

The second driver of attrition is caseloads that exceed professional standards. OCFW requests two additional attorneys and one mitigation specialist to reduce caseloads to the upper limit of the professional standard, six cases. OCFW requests that these new positions be funded as follows: \$85,000 in FY2020, and \$100,000 in FY2021, for each attorney; \$62,500 in FY2020, and \$70,000 in FY2021, for the mitigation specialist.

For added staff, OCFW requests money to pay for necessary travel (\$30,000 over the biennium), Professional Fees & Services (\$12,000 over the biennium), and Other Personnel Cost (\$1,950 in FY2020; \$2,925 in FY2021), As Other Operating Expenses, OCFW requests money for health insurance (\$3,900 in FY2020; \$5,850 in FY2021), computers and equipment (\$15,000 in FY2020), and legal research subscriptions (\$3,900 in FY2020 and FY2021).

Since OCFW opened in 2010, 27 staff have departed, the equivalent of over 168% of the present staff size. For fiscal year 2018, OCFW expects a 63% attrition rate for attorneys. Attrition negatively impacts OCFW's effectiveness; the costs of turnover are high because staff taking over transferred cases must start their work from scratch.

Noncompetitive salaries and the presence of better paying competitor offices in close proximity are an ongoing source of staffing instability. Without more competitive salaries, OCFW will continue to lose key staff after they have been trained and gained valuable experience.

The current average OCFW caseload per attorney is 8.5 co-counseled cases, whereas the Texas and national standard is 4 to 6.

#### **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

OCFW requests funding to improve its management and function through the addition of a Deputy Director, a Staff Services Officer, necessary money for travel and litigation expenses, and equipment.

The OCFW has the same structure it had when it was much smaller; however, with the agency at its present size, OCFW requests that its management structure be enhanced through the addition of a Deputy Director. A Deputy Director would supervise the litigation of the office and personnel, freeing up the Director to manage internal and external responsibilities more effectively.

OCFW has only one accountant who handles all the agency's accounting, budgeting, purchasing, and human resources functions, but the number of reimbursement and payments OCFW processes is two to three times larger than other agencies of similar size. The OCFW requests that a Staff Services Officer position be created to more effectively manage its financial responsibilities.

OCFW requests that the Deputy Director and the Staff Services Officer positions be funded at \$110,000 and \$60,000 per year, respectively, Other Personnel Cost \$850 per year plus additional money for equipment (\$10,000) and a legal research subscription for the Deputy Director (\$1,300).

OCFW has a large docket of time- and resource-intensive evidentiary hearings all across Texas. To cover the travel and litigation costs of its existing caseload, OCFW requests an additional \$250,000 over the biennium for travel and professional fees and services.

As Other Operating Expenses, OCFW requests money for health insurance (\$1,700 in FY2020 and FY2021), computers and equipment for new staff (\$10,000 in FY2020), a legal research subscription (\$1,300 in FY2020 and FY2021), and six additional computers to replace six currently on loan from OCA (\$12,000 in FY2020).

#### **EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:**

A recent outside assessment of OCFW noted that the Director "wears too many hats," and no one person could adequately supervise the work of eight attorneys, five mitigation specialists, a legal assistant, and an accountant, while handling a caseload, preparing reports and legislative materials, advocating for agency interests, and managing a diverse array of internal and external responsibilities.

The number of financial documents processed by OCFW is disproportionate to its size. In FY2017, OCFW processed and paid 1034 financial documents with only one accountant. By contrast, a similarly sized judicial agency with one accountant processed just 334 financial documents, and another judicial agency of similar size processed 299 financial documents—less than one-third the number OCFW generated—with the assistance of both an accountant and a Director of Finance.

OCFW handles many more hearings than initially anticipated. During the first four years of operations, OCFW handled an average of 3.5 hearings; during FY2016, OCFW juggled 24 cases in the hearing stage. Most hearings require substantial out-of-town travel and hotel expenses.

Last legislative session, the OCFW base budget was reduced by approximately \$112,000, which has limited the number of out-of-county OCFW can handle and the ability of OCFW to retain necessary expert assistance.

Due in part to travel- and expert-assistance-related budgetary limitations, OCFW has had to adjourn litigation into subsequent fiscal years and seek additional money from counties for expert costs.

#### **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

**FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT POSITIONS (FTE):** 

In Senate Bill 1743 (SB1743), the 84th Legislature expanded OCFW's mandate to include the representation of noncapital inmates in cases where questionable forensic science contributed to the conviction. SB1743, however, did not appropriate any funding to OCFW for this work, and no additional funding accompanied the expanded mandate during either the 84th or 85th Legislative sessions.

OCFW requests funding to represent inmates in these forensic science challenges at the levels generally anticipated by the fiscal note accompanying SB 1743. As such, OCFW requests that this program be funded incrementally through the addition of two attorneys in FY 2020 (\$170,000), and a third attorney in FY2021 (\$255,000). In addition, OCFW requests funding for Other Personnel Cost (\$850 in FY2020; \$1,275 in FY2020), necessary professional fees and services to retain necessary experts for these complicated cases (\$100,000 over the biennium), travel (\$30,000 over the biennium), equipment and computer costs (\$10,000 in FY2020); \$5,000 in FY2021), health insurance (\$1,700 in FY2020; \$2,550 in FY2021) and legal research subscriptions (\$2,600 in FY2020; \$3,900 in FY2021).

#### **EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:**

According to the National Registry of Exonerations, there have been at least 156 exonerations in Texas since 1989 in which flawed forensic science was a contributing factor.

OCFW has been unable to handle any cases under this expanded mandate because it lacks the resources to do so.

Item Comment: Payroll comprises 80% of OCFW's lean budget. Historically, OCFW has found ways to do more with less. For example, there is just one legal assistant to support the work of 14 legal staff, while OCFW staff maintain a caseload that exceeds professional standards. During the 85th Legislative Session, OCFW's base budget was reduced by 4%. While operating with fewer resources than before, OCFW's caseload of time- and resource-intensive evidentiary hearings has grown. The 4% base reduction has made it difficult to conclude evidentiary hearings over the present biennium. Moreover, as noted elsewhere in this request, OCFW core mission and effectiveness is hampered by harmfully high rates of staff attrition due to high caseloads and noncompetitive salaries. Any further reduction to OCFW's budget would negatively impact OCFW's ability to provide essential services. Because of the nature of its budget, OCFW would have no choice but to layoff one FTE, and reduce the budget allocated to travel. The loss of one FTE and a reduction in the budget available for necessary statewide travel at a time when office caseloads exceed professional standards, attrition is at damaging levels, and OCFW's budget limits the number of hearings and cases that can be litigated, would have a detrimental impact on the agency's ability to maintain expected levels of services and key performance measures.

# Description:

For several years, OCFW has sought to reduce the volume of paper it consumes by mandating that all case records be maintained electronically and case-related communication occur electronically where feasible. Absent compelling circumstances, the only paper generated by OCFW is that which is required in connection with court filings, hearing exhibits, and similar legal representation purposes, as well as for the maintenance of financial records as required by the Comptroller. Where printing is required, it is done double-sided where possible. Because these strategies have been in place for several years, the costs savings are lower than they might otherwise be in connection with the Article IX, Section 7.15, Document Production Standards mandate. Generally speaking, OCFW paper usage can be expected to fluctuate based on external factors such as litigation needs in particular cases or court requirements.
